type of tactics that can be used to sabotage academic integrity.




Figure 1: Types of Dishonesty in Academic Writing




Figure 2: Culture of Academic Integrity

Institutions can foster professor and student cooperation to advance academic integrity. Peer review and opportunity for group work are part of this.




Figure 3: Three Pillars of Academic Integrity




Figure 4: The Fundamental Values of Academics Integrity
